

A stroller, a power wheelchair, a standing frame, a Zassy Easy S chair (with an outdoor frame and an indoor frame) and an accessible bike. Add this to a host of accessible features at home . . . Tyler has lots of different kinds of equipment all with a specific purpose.

His stroller allows Mom to easily take Tyler for short outings; his standing frame is useful at home to give Tyler some exercise and respite from being in a chair all day long. The outdoor frame for the Zassy chair provides the means for safe transport on the bus to and from school and the indoor frame can be used for some activities. The fully accessible and specialized bike is just for fun.

The newest addition to the slew of equipment is a power wheelchair and with that Tyler's first taste of freedom. His new wheelchair (that Tyler will use at school) has a lift. Mom says that will be really useful for being able to get things down on his own. He can reach his backpack from the hanger at school. "Excuse me ladies" . . . as he wizzes by demonstrating the power and agility of his new chair (and the speed). "Slow down" Mom says as he races down the driveway – "only to the end of the pavement" she chides. "I am determined that my son will be independent and this chair such a great start."

We have known Tyler (his twin brother Colton and older brother Grayson) and his family for a long time. Tyler was born with CP. We have been very pleased to be a part of a larger group of organizations providing the equipment for Tyler and his quest for independence. The **Children's Ability Fund** initially supplied a standing frame, then a modified bike and now a new addition – a grant for a fully accessible modified vehicle.

"The vehicle will mean so much to this family" Mom says. We can go together as a family. The new vehicle will include a ramp so that Mom doesn't have to physically lift Tyler (getting bigger all the time) in and out of his car seat. Just another step in Tyler's independence.

"Bye Mom" . . . and zoom he is gone!


VEHICLE ADAPTATION PROGRAM

Accessible, affordable transportation for families of children with disabilities continues to be an ongoing challenge. Established in 2008, the **Children's Ability Fund** vehicle adaptation program offers a grant of up to \$5,000 towards the cost of accessible equipment for a vehicle or a complete vehicle modification.

BIKES FOR TYKES PROGRAM

The **Bikes for Tykes** program was introduced to provide funding for the adaptation of a bicycle for the individual needs of a child with a disability. Bikes provide an independent mode of transportation that helps build self-esteem and gives a sense of freedom. Special adaptations to a bicycle can help a child with disabilities "delight in being a child".

BIKES - PARTNERSHIP

You Can Ride TOO is a partnership between the pediatric physiotherapists and occupational therapists and the Edmonton Bicycle Commuters Society. Part of their vision is to assist children with special needs.

One of their programs – Adapted bicycle loan program – is an opportunity for families to borrow an adapted bike over the summer months.

The potential of one's self depends greatly on whether he or she has the ability to achieve it. If one loses ability it becomes difficult to fulfill potential, to become a fully participating member of society. This is why the **Children's Ability Fund** and the work it does is so important to the disabled community. It provides the equipment and devices necessary to individuals who need it in order to live lives with meaning and purpose.

In my own case, the **Children's Ability Fund** purchased a ramp for my modified wheelchair van fifteen years ago. (They also remembered me from all those years ago).

This year, when I needed elevating footrests on my wheelchair, the **Children's Ability Fund** covered the exorbitant cost of them as well as

a lock-down mechanism for my wheelchair in my vehicle I now have the ability to elevate my footrests, and thus my legs, on my own. The ability to do this means I will have better circulation, less edema in my feet and the possibility to limit atrophy in my leg muscles. Combined, I have much less pain and do not need to rely on medication or other people to relieve that pain. I can focus on other things; like my education, my work, I can contribute more around my household, and I generally just feel better.

The lock-down mechanism in my vehicle locks my chair to the floor of the vehicle so if I am in an accident my chair does not flip, move, or turn over. Without this mechanism, I would not be able to use my vehicle and would either be stuck at home or need to rely on less reliable modes of transportation. Because of the Children's Ability Fund, I can now travel around the city in safety.



I am extremely fortunate to have what I have; a vehicle that many people don't have and a power wheelchair complete with elevating footrests. But costs for extras add up quickly and not everyone is as fortunate. Sometimes necessary items are not covered and still cost thousands of dollars.

People who need these items just to get out of bed are not looking for handouts; we are looking for the tools to become participating members of society and live worthwhile lives. The **Children's Ability Fund** provides those tools and with them comes the possibility for those with disabilities to live up to, and even exceed, their potential. It is essential that their work continues.
